Assuming this motion is passed, we will aim to call an Extraordinary

General Meeting at the Spring 2008 Conference to make the necessary amendments to the HBA's Articles of Association.

There I was minding my own business when the then Chief Executive and his Deputy, Steve Allen and John Newstead, cornered me in the bar and bought me a drink. I should have suspected then that something was afoot! And it was ...

How would you like to organise next year's Hospital Radio Awards was the question. If my memory is correct, I had just got over a throat infection and was on antibiotics. Well, those mixed with this unexpected drink must have made me loose my marbles as I said, without a thought of what was involved, yes.

I might point out that I had never produced anything like this before.

So where did I start? The first thing was to give it a fresh look are more importantly bring our Awards to the attention of the media, as I felt we hadn't had much publicity since the days of the presentations at the BT Tower and broadcast on BBC Radio 2.

So I approached a number of people who worked in the industry and asked if they would judge the Awards for us. If you recall in previous years, it was always the job of the EC.

The next was the cost. My first year was made easy, as I knew I would have the donation from PPL to cover the cost of the event.

Then there was the show itself. This is when I turned to Chris Cook for help. Chris had worked with me four years at Radio Tyneside and I knew he was the ideal man for the job. Also he was working at the BBC in London and I knew he had a number of contacts.

Chris relished the idea of producing the show and having been put in touch with COSMIC, the company who built the sets along with lighting and sound, he was off.

I had no idea what he had in mind for that night at the Marriott Hotel in Slough/Windsor.

Entries came in hard and fast, judging was done, trophies purchased

and certificates produced.

It was decided to get some well 2known faces to present the Awards so favours were called in and along with Chris's contacts we had Carol Kirkwood, Chris Jarvis, Alan Dedicoat and Clive Warren. Who was to host the event? We lined up Lorraine Kelly through my contact Paul Robinson.

As it happened, Lorraine's agent had got the wrong date, which resulted in her not being able to be there. What happened? Paul Robinson was drafted in as her replacement.

I remember the Friday evening of that weekend watching all this equipment being installed at the hotel and wondering what Chris was up to. The team from COSMIC worked throughout the night and the next morning Chris took me through to the ballroom to have look at the set. My first words were 'Are we producing the Eurovision Song Contest?'

Well, I think the rest is history. The new look National Hospital Radio Awards was a great success with everyone thoroughly enjoying themselves and many bottles of wine being consumed.

So what happens next in 2004 was the next question. Yes, I was again tasked with organising the Awards for Leeds.

You the members at the 2003 AGM said you wanted us to continue with the shows, the only problem I had was that PPL had indicated that they had no objection to part of their donation being used for Awards but didn't want the whole amount being used for the event.

So sponsorship of the Awards was sought and CBBC, IRN, Real Radio and Radio Aire came on board and as a

result another great evening was had by all.

By this time, I think the EC was quite happy for me to continue producing the event, the only problem was that it was becoming more expensive each year and the 2005 Awards were to be held in Belfast!

Well I shouldn't have needed to worry thanks to the sterling work by Eileen Manion, Davey Downes and Don Bannister over in Northern Ireland.

The conference weekend was a sell out and the entries for Awards exceeded previous years. One thing sticks in my mind that year – the ice sculpture! I don't think anyone attending didn't have the picture taken with that sculpture.

Onto Blackpool and Chris and I decided this was to be our last. The workload was getting very heavy, the costs were going up and sponsorship was becoming more difficult.

But you know, you get into the organising of something which turns out to be a huge success on the evening and you say, 'OK we'll do another year'.

The only problem bothering me was the cost and at Blackpool we didn't cover all of them with our sponsorship.

We did decide that Northampton was to be the last one for us. Again Chris organised a great show which appeared to be enjoyed by all. It was nice to get back some of the guests who were at our first show in Slough/Windsor.

It was a sad night for us both but we felt we had gone as far as we could and it was time for someone else to take on the task at Leeds.

Also, this year we made a huge loss as we couldn't get the sponsorship, losing CBBC and Five Live was a big blow. I would like to say thanks to John Watson who tried hard to get a main sponsor for the whole event, which sadly fell at the last hurdle.

I would also like to thank everyone who spoke to me after the show, thanking us for our hard work and also the letters received from a number of stations.

So what happens next year? I am sure there is someone able to continue the standard of Awards we have had over the past five years. We need a main sponsor as we had with BT many years ago, so if you have any contacts let the EC know as soon as possible. But to whoever takes over, remember, Awards preparation starts in August and is constant up until the night itself.

Welcome to the New HBA Website

Saturday, 31st March 2007, wasn't just the Spring Conference and Awards day; it also marked the next chapter in the history of the HBA's website.

I took over responsibility for the website just over a year ago and have spent that time developing the look and functionality of the site.

The site is by no finished, however, and it probably never will be as I hope to keep adding and improving.

It's divided into three sections; one for the general public, one for HBA members and another for members of the Executive Committee.

The 'public' section tells people all about the HBA and a way to contact members of the EC as well as member stations. I've really tried to funnel visitors through to the station they want. This means that your station has much more of a presence than before, with each station having its own page, so I'd encourage you to take a look, log in and edit your details to make sure your page looks as good as possible!

The 'member' section gives news and events from the HBA as well as member stations and provides up-to-

date information on the National Hospital Radio Awards.

Each HBA region has its own minisite which also forms part of the main site under 'Regions'.

Once you've logged in, you'll have access to 'Media' and 'Support' as well as 'my Home' with its nine sub-sections which are all designed to help member stations. Anyone can log in and there are different levels of access: Level 1 for those pending approval by their station's rep, Level 2 for HBA Associate Members, Level 3 for members of member stations, Level 4 for administrators from member stations (main contact and others as requested), Level 5 for HBA Regional Reps; Level 6 for members of the EC.


There's a lot to explore and many ways to publicise your station and its events.

Conference Bursary

The HBA Conference Bursary was introduced in 1994 in memory of Brian Snowden, acknowledging his commitment to the Association and hospital radio. The bursary is now also dedicated to Ken Fulstow, George and Myra Burton, and Helen Hamilton, recognising their contributions to the Association.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? – Applicants should be active volunteers within a Full Member of the HBA. The successful applicant usually has not previously attended a conference. We are unable to award bursaries to young persons under the age of 18 unless we receive written parental consent and an adult from the applicant's station is willing to accept responsibility for their welfare whilst attending conference.

THE PURPOSE – The bursary provides successful applicants with an opportunity to meet fellow hospital broadcasters, and to find out about the work of other stations and the HBA. HBA conferences provide a training opportunity through seminars and workshops, and enable delegates to network with fellow hospital broadcasters, providing insight into the wider aspects of hospital broadcasting and the national association.

Successful applicants are required to write a report on the conference for their station's management committee, with a copy provided to the HBA Treasurer within one month of the conference. The report should explain what the recipient learnt at conference, detail the best and least good things about the weekend, and suggest ideas that the station's management committee should consider implementing.

WHAT DOES IT COVER? - The bursary pays up to the residential costs for individual applicants to attend the full weekend conference. Applications for payment of travel costs will also be considered.

HOW DO I APPLY? – Applicants should complete Section 1 the attached form, and then obtain the endorsement of the Chairman (or another officer) of their station in Section 2. The completed form should be sent to Julie Cox, HBA Treasurer, 37 Alford Street, Grantham, Lincolnshire, NG31 8BX, to be received at least twelve weeks before the conference to which the application refers.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT? – Applications are judged on merit by the HBA's Conference Bursary Subcommittee, which consists of June Snowden, Julie Cox and Nigel Dallard. The full terms of reference of the subcommittee can be found on the members-only section of the HBA website, or are available on request. Applicants will be informed of the success or otherwise of their application at least 8 weeks before the conference. Successful applicants will be required to pay an amount equivalent to the deposit payable for the conference, such amount being repaid on the submission to the HBA Treasurer of a copy of their report on the conference.

ARE APPLICANTS' NAMES PUBLISHED? – HBA would prefer to be able to publicise the names of those in receipt of the bursary. We do, however, understand that applicants may be sensitive about this information being released. You can, therefore, request that your name remain confidential by ticking the appropriate box on the application form. We will, however, be obliged to release your name to the Charity Commission if they ask for it after reviewing our Annual Report and Accounts, even if you ask for it to remain confidential.

PLEASE NOTE – The decision of the Conference Bursary Subcommittee is final and no correspondence will be entered into. If it is deemed that all the applicants are inappropriate, the award may not be given. The attendance, as paying delegates, of other volunteers from the same HBA member will not affect an application, except that we are unable to make awards to young persons under the age of 18 who are attending conference unaccompanied by an adult.

HBA Grants

The HBA Grants programme was introduced in 2006 following the Executive Committee's suggestion to PPL that a proportion of their donations to the Association in 2004 and 2005 be allocated for grants to member stations.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? - Applications are restricted to Full Members of the HBA.

THE PURPOSE – The grants are intended to enable hospital broadcasting organisations to purchase equipment or other materials required by them which they are unable to afford to purchase from their own funds.

HOW DO I APPLY? - Applicants should identify the equipment or other materials that meet(s) their needs and should obtain a quotation (ideally more than one) for the supply. They should then complete the application form and send it, together with copies of the quotation(s), their constitution (or other governing document) and their latest annual report & accounts, to Dave Nicholson, HBA Vice President, East Cottage, Milbourne Hall, Milbourne, Newcastle upon Tyne, NE20 0EB.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT? – Applications will be acknowledged on receipt. The subcommittee will meet bi-monthly to consider applications. As soon as possible after consideration, applicants will be informed as to the success or otherwise of their application. Successful applicants should expect to receive a cheque within 28 days of their application being granted. Copies of invoices confirming purchase of the equipment/materials should be forwarded to HBA within 6 months of the grant cheque being issued. Failure to provide such evidence of purchase may result in full repayment of the grant being requested.

Applications are judged on merit by the HBA's Grants Subcommittee, which consists of Dave Nicholson, John Harper, Dave Lockyer and a representative from PPL. If a conflict of interest arises between a member of the subcommittee and an application, the conflicted member will withdraw from discussions surrounding the particular application and, if necessary, further temporary members will be co-opted to the subcommittee. The full terms of reference of the subcommittee can be found on the members-only section of the HBA website, or are available on request.

ARE DETAILS OF SUCCESSFUL APPLICATIONS PUBLISHED? – HBA would like to maximise the publicity obtained, both local to the recipient of the grant and nationally, and would expect successful applicants to work closely with the HBA's Public Relations Manager to achieve this.

HBA would anticipate providing details of all grants made in its Annual Report and Accounts.

PLEASE NOTE – The decision of the Grants Subcommittee is final and no correspondence will be entered into. The subcommittee may, at its sole discretion, provide unsuccessful applicants with an indication as to why their application failed - for instance, applicants can expect to be informed if they failed to provide all necessary supporting paperwork, or their application was deemed ineligible in other ways. However, applicants should understand that the funds available are limited and not all applications that meet all the required criteria are likely to be funded.


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
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
