Membership Renewals

If you're reading this, you or your station have renewed your membership of HBA; thank you. What you get out of any organisation depends a great deal on what you put in. If you haven't attended a conference or a regional meeting for a long time (or ever), please try to make the effort - you'll find the exchange of ideas between fellow hospital broadcasters and charity administrators very useful. If you've got any burning question about anything hospital broadcasting related in the meantime, please feel free to contact any member of the Executive Committee. If you haven't targeted the best person to answer your query, we'll forward it to that person. And if you've got any ideas about new services you'd like to see HBA develop, now is the time to get in

And now, please excuse me whilst I have a little moan about the tardiness of a number of member stations in renewing their membership. Renewals were invited in mid-March, with reminders sent in the third week of April and in mid-May. All explained that the deadline was 1st June. Despite all that, a significant minority of stations contacted either Marie or myself in the last few days of May begging for an extension, or sent cheques in after

the deadline. The excuses were many and varied but rarely compelling. Officially, the Executive Committee have no discretion with regards to late renewals, as the firm cut-off date is written into the Articles of Association. Unofficially, we have allowed a few days for 'postal delays'. However, if your station was one of those late renewing its subscription and this is indicative of the general state of your station's administration, can I suggest that you seriously address the issue, because other organisations may not be as forgiving as HBA – if you can't pay an invoice within ten weeks of receipt, there's something clearly wrong with your processes. OK, moan over.

Networking

Over the past few months, HBA has started to network with more organisations whose aims are similar to ours, or whose work could impact hospital broadcasters. Dave Nicholson already liaises with PPL and Ofcom. More recently, June has had meetings with Attend (the national umbrella organisation for hospital Leagues of Friends), the National Association of (NHS) Voluntary Service Managers and the Time for Health Partnership - a group including Attend, the WRVS and the Dept of Health, amongst others. HBA and the Talking Newspaper Federation are associate members of each other, with me as the HBA's liaison point. I have also started talking to the Chief Executive of the Prison Radio Association. If you've got any other suggestions for organisations we should be talking to, please get in touch.

The Future of Hospital Radio

In parallel with the discussions about the future strategic direction of HBA, the Executive Committee has also been discussing the future of hospital radio in the light of the reconfiguration of the NHS. The NHS seems to be heading towards the general downgrading or closing of the traditional district general hospital, replacing them with large regional hospitals for those seriously ill or in

need of complex operations and more community-based services for those who need less intensive care. Together with the trend towards shorter hospital stays and much more day surgery, these changes are clearly going to have an impact on hospital radio stations. HBA would like to be in a position where it can provide help and guidance to stations as and when they are impacted.

A direction that a number of stations are pursuing or considering is internet broadcasting. This is the first area in which HBA is preparing guidance. At the time of writing, it is not ready for release but let me just say a few words of caution. It's not as simple as connecting your output to a computer, encoding it and putting a link to the stream on your website. Whilst that may enable people anywhere in the world to

listen to you, it could also get you into legal hot water.

To stream music on the internet, you need a licence from both PPL and MCPS/PRS. If you broadcast news from an external source, such as IRN, you'll need to talk to them. And if you broadcast commentary from any local sports club, or local concerts etc, you'll need their permission too.

And then there's the issue of Charity Law; most hospital radio stations are registered charities. In England and Wales, even if you are not a registered charity, you are likely to be a charity (and thus subject to Charity Law), as the hospital broadcasting has been recognised as a charitable activity. A charity is only legally allowed to do things that, directly or indirectly, further its charitable objects.

If your station's governing document states that it exists to provide a broadcasting service to patients in XYZ hospital, then you're not allowed to spend money or other resources broadcasting to people at home. If you do, then your station's management committee could find themselves personally liable for any expense incurred.

Please think carefully before you start internet broadcasting. Read the HBA guidance, which should be available shortly, or contact myself or Paul Easton for further advice.

Radio Academy

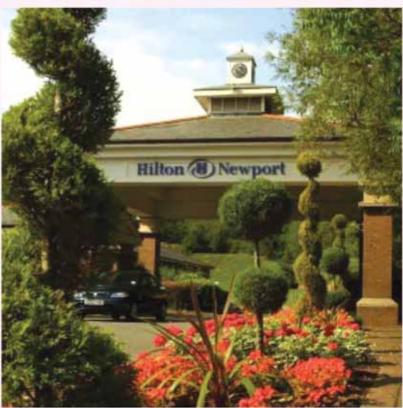

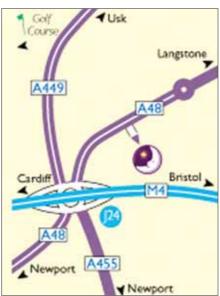
For those arriving later at the hotel, I understand the usual quiz will be available and will probably be just as competitive as the karting.

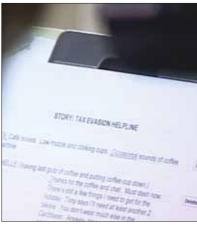

Something For Free from the Taxman









You may think that HM Revenue & Customs are just there to take your hard earned money away but think again. In this issue of On Air you'll find a free CD that will tell you a lot about subjects that you may not associate with Revenue & Customs!

On the CD you will find several 'mini-soap operas' that tell you all about Tax Credits, National Minimum Wage, Self Assessment, Taxback, the Child Trust Fund, Self Employment and Tax Evasion. The soaps are timeless and are written to make these subjects easy to understand. You can easily drop them into your normal programming, just as you would with promotions, trailers and adverts.

The CD has been produced especially for hospital radio by HMRC's Local Revenue & Customs have a special team of local radio broadcasters. They cover the whole of the country and are happy to come along to radio stations to talk about any of the many topics that their department deals with. The CD features some of these broadcasters

and you can hear how we have tapped into their, until now, hidden acting talents.

Tony Sloan, one of HMRC's broadcasters, is also is a member of Radio Tyneside in Newcastle. He told us 'It's a great team to work with as, just like hospital radio, we are all volunteers who enjoy getting important and useful information across to our customers via the airwaves in addition to our normal day jobs. We can be asked to appear on BBC, Independent and Community Radio stations. The photogenic amongst us have even appeared on TV! And, of course, we are available to visit hospital radio stations the length and breadth of the UK.

Tom Waples from the HMRC Press Office has been working with the HBA to create the CD. Tom says 'It's great to have finally recorded the CD. We had fun producing it and hope that it will be a useful addition to your programmes. Some of our broadcasters already have a regular slot on their local hospital radio

station, answering questions on a wide range of HMRC related matters. We are more than happy to visit any station; all you have to do is get in touch'.

Tom added, 'We are recording a similar CD with the same material recorded in Welsh, Urdu and Punjabi for stations whose listeners speak these languages. This will be available in the late summer and stations who'd like a copy in any of these languages should get in touch with HBA who will send you one.'

Celebrations for Burnley

Hospital Radio Burnley celebrated 50 years of broadcasting in June 2007.

Their aims and objectives are 'to mitigate the effect and aid recovery of the infirm and all who are hospitalised within the area by providing a broadcast service'.

From 1957 we broadcast at the now defunct Victoria Hospital; we then moved to the old Chapel at Burnley General Hospital until moving to new premises adjacent to the old Concert Hall. Those studios were completely refurbished in the late eighties and in 1992 culminated in the official opening by the then Mayor and Mayoress of Burnley, Councillor and Mrs. Edward C. Ingham in October of the same year.

Radio Burnley was founded by John Foulds and initially broadcast football commentary from Turf Moor to all the hospitals in the Burnley area; these broadcasts pre-dated the full service of request and religious programmes that were aired at evenings and weekends.

In the mid eighties, the then management of Radio Burnley took over the running of the station and after a few hiccups around 1988, the station was recognised in the form it is today. We have thirty active dedicated members of all ages and from all walks of life who give their time and services to provide interesting, stimulating and amusing broadcasts.

Ninety percent of our programmes are broadcast live. This is proved by the very rare odd mistake we make from time to time ... we are not professional, just natural.

However, it has not all been plain sailing. In 2000, we found to our horror that half of the Hospital was not receiving our broadcasts; partly because we then broadcast on a hard line (similar to a telephone cable). During various building projects, the line was a repeated victim of the odd spade and pickaxe! This situation became a blessing in disguise, as it proved there was no room for complacency within our organisation. We found hardly anybody was listening to our broadcasts or even knew of our service. We had to do something and fast to reassert our presence within Burnley General Hospital.

Firstly, we had to recruit people to create awareness among patients and staff alike for although we had such modern equipment and the staff to broadcast high quality programmes, we had no way of knowing whether the patients were listening. We promptly set about recruiting Ward liaison staff to check that the headsets were up for the job and most importantly, the patients

were receiving our transmissions.

A sub-committee was set up to think of ways to raise our profile within the Hospital. The committee consisted of John Robinson, Chair HRB, Alan Baldwin, Engineer and Charlie Tuna, Presenter (in whose house we held the meetings) and myself, Bryan Sisson, the Treasurer of the station, who had to keep a tight hold on the purse strings.

After a few head scratching sessions, the man with the fishy name, 'Charlie Tuna' suggested a world record attempt of some sort ... but what? A few agonising moments later, Charlie hit on the idea of a mammoth broadcast ... this way we could put Hospital Radio Burnley back on the map and raise a few guid in the process!

A couple of days later, wheels were set in motion for our world record attempt. We contacted the people at Guiness World Records for rules and guidelines for this event. When we received the documentation from Guiness we were rather taken aback by the rules. We would have to have, at four hourly intervals, an independent witness, a trained medic, a volunteer to log all the music played and a volunteer to assist with the breaks that the presenter was allowed. We then had to decide who was going to attempt the world record. The latter was easy. Charlie suggested it ... Charlie could do it!

It took about six months to get everything and everybody in place. Charlie could only have one fifteenminute break in every eight hours. He could not be interviewed by anyone and the records he played could not be more than six minutes and no less than two minutes in duration. The whole thing had to be recorded for proof of the attempt and that all the rules and regulations were being adhered to ... so we videoed the whole attempt.

Charlie and John trudged the streets of Burnley and district searching for possible sponsors for the record attempt. Sponsorship was offered to local businesses for a few pence per full hour that the attempt lasted, we had badges made; these were sold for £1, each badge purchased the buyer would have his/her name entered into a prize draw for some super prizes that were donated by the larger companies that agreed to take part in the attempt.

The record for the longest broadcast by an individual, which stood at 73 hours and 56 minutes, was held by a presenter on 'Ton Radio' in the Ukraine. We printed a newsletter to the station membership and everybody seemed to be available in March 2001 and so the attempt was to start at 10 o'clock on 10th March 2001.

We had fundraising events around the town as the attempt was in progress and sold nearly all of our badges. It seemed the entire town was behind us but more importantly, they were learning about our voluntary organisation, Hospital Radio Burnley. The strangest thing is, all the staff at HRB assumed fishy names as the event unfolded, not only did we have a Charlie Tuna, we can now also boast a 'Barry Cuda', a Sue Shee, Ali Butt and a Rocky Shorr to name but a few.

On Saturday, 10th March at 10am, the challenge began; the first track to

start the challenge was picked by the then Mayor of Burnley, Councillor Mr Rafique Malik. Many people were standing outside the studio windows each with their own words of encouragement. During the challenge, the studios were awash with visitors and well wishers. Amongst the volunteers for a four-hour shift were Julie Hesmondhalgh (Hayley from Coronation Street), Tony Berry of the Houghton Weavers, Tony Thorpe of the Rubettes and June Snowden.

Local as well as big businesses that sponsored the attempt was P3 Computers who set up a web cam and a website so the whole world could follow the event. Airtours, Asda, Marsden Building Society and a host of other businesses supported the challenge.

On Tuesday, 13th March 2001 to a rousing cheer from a studio full of people including Charlie's proud parents and a TV cameraman from the BBC, an exhausted Charlie Tuna finally ended his challenge after 75 hours and two minutes of continuous broadcasting. Subject to confirmation from the Guiness world records (who did confirm the record) Hospital Radio Burnley had broken the world record by an amazing 1 hour and seven minutes. This may not sound much until you realise that the Americans, the Canadians and the Australians have all tried to break our record and failed.

We raised a fantastic amount of money from the event. So to say thank you to all the wards that helped with the supply of medically trained staff and witnesses during the world record attempt, we donated a quarter of the amount raised back by buying essentials for those particular wards.

Along the way, Hospital Radio Burnley has accumulated many famous friends including Julie Hesmondhalgh, Tony Berry (Houghton Weavers), Tony Thorpe (Rubettes), David Essex and ... Sooty! With no disrespect, our biggest catch is Sir Anthony Hopkins.

HRB have a mascot, a big fluorescent orange and green dinosaur, name of Charlie Dinosaur ... (CD) who can be seen regularly in the town centre wooing the crowds. His latest outing was a 'Midget Adventure'. John West, Chair of HRB, bought a 1972 MG Midget ... in several cardboard boxes. John has restored the car to its former glory and to raise cash for HRB decided to take it on a 800 miles run to Inverness and back. All the cash raised from this has been put to one side for our 50th birthday celebrations. But not only is Hospital Radio Burnley 50 years





old this year ... we have again moved to new premises, adjacent to the Post Room and very nice they are too.

In the past year or so, we have taken advantage of various lottery grants to equip the station. We have just taken delivery of a new Sonifex broadcast mixer at a cost of £5,500 to complement the one we bought earlier. We can now, with a good following wind, broadcast from anywhere on the planet.

Boasting two studios, HRB are equipped to BBC standards and in the near future, hope to broadcast 24 hours a day. We have been helped along the way by our very good friends 'The League of Voluntary workers, who have donated a large amount of money to help with our relocation.

Broadcasting on 'channel one' on the Patientline system, we are now actively seeking more sponsors for the programmes. We can interact with the patient through the free telephone number on the Patientline system, *800.

On 1st June, the new studios were officially opened by Coronation Street star Julie Hesmondhalgh' alias 'Hayley Cropper'. Amongst the guests were June Snowden, HBA President and Alan Green, the Chairman of East Lancashire Hospitals NHS Trust. The evening was a tremendous success,

much to the relief of Studio Manager Bryan Sisson, who, along with the station's Personnel officer, Pam Tweedie and studio engineer Colin Wakefield made the evening run smoothly.

Hospital Radio Burnley, after fifty years, is still 'A friendly voice at every bedside'.

PATRICK'S COUNTDOWN

Hospital Radio Burnley presenter, Patrick McCann has beaten all odds with serious health problems and has won a 'teapot'. Patrick, 24, was born just four pounds in weight and without a vital valve in his heart; he endured two operations within days of his birth and has had many since. Patrick was one of the first people in the country to undergo 'Ablasion therapy' at St Bartholomew's Hospital in London, a form of laser treatment for the heart.

In 2002, he was fitted with two pacemakers on separate occasions but this hasn't dampened his zest for achievement. Patrick joined HRB in 2006 and is hoping to gain a place at the Arden School of Theatre in Manchester.

Said Patrick, 'I couldn't believe it when I got the letter telling me I had passed my audition for the show. I have tried twice before to get on the programme, the first, when I was only 14 and then I had to miss because I was in hospital'.

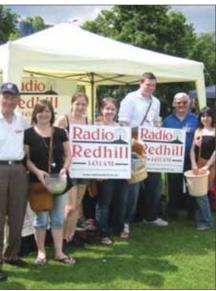
Radio Redhill's fundraising team were also present during the busy Fun Day in the Memorial Park, which proved to be one of the most successful events for them so far this year.

Unlike Soundings' home-grown audio features (at www.soundings.org/listen), contributions do not have to be visual-impairment specific. They can be about pretty well anything at all and can be submitted in any audio format (including ftp upload). Items will not normally be edited by Soundings so they should please be in a ready-to-use state and, of course, they must be copyright and royalty-free.

The current selection of Soundings Echo audio material can be found at www.soundings.org/echo and for further information about contributing please visit the media 'Support' page on the Soundings web site at www.soundings.org/support, where fuller details are given.

And, of course, as well as contributing your own material, you can use what's up there. It's all free and, apart from adding a two-line introductory explanation (which is provided, along with the duration and the 'air-by' date), the features are ready to broadcast.

Radio Royal Reach for the Sky

The following is an extract from a recent Bradford Telegraph ...

It started with little more than a gramophone, a couple speakers and a small collection of current hits. The year was 1952 and the station was known as The Medicine Chest.

Since then it has evolved into Radio Royal and has been a friend at the bedside of patients for more than half a century.

Until recently, most of the station's music was on vinyl singles, albums and CDs. But technological advances mean all the music is now stored on computer, enabling presenters to easily grant requests for particular songs.

And the advent of an automated play out system means the station is on air 24 hours a day, a high tech change from the days of The Medicine Chest.

And the comfort and entertainment the station offers to patients in Bradford Royal Infirmary is clearly a hit. Since the bedside entertainment system Patientline was installed a couple of years ago, the station has been able to monitor its success with monthly figures produced ranking the most popular television channels and radio stations.

While patients have to pay to watch television, all radio stations are free and monthly figures show that Radio Royal is beating most of its competition hands down.

Figures produced on February 14 show patients listened to 3,683 hours of Radio Royal output in the previous month, better than all the BBC radio stations and stations such as Classic FM and only pipped by the Pulse but not for long if Radio Royal chairman Ashley Williams has anything to do with it. He has witnessed the evolution of the station, having been involved for 21 years, despite the fact he is just 34.

And his continued involvement is all the more amazing considering he moved to Ipswich two years ago.

He maintains the technical side of things and is also a presenter even presenting the children's hour with his seven year old daughter Lucy who lives in Haworth and is the main reason for his continued links with Bradford.

The pre-recorded show goes out each day at 3pm and is a mix of music, nursery rhymes and stories and is a big hit on the children's wards.

At the moment, Ashley is busy working on plans to broadcast live concerts and productions from St George's Hall.

He also wants to up the stations sports output on a Saturday afternoon





by broadcasting live from Bradford City's home games, if a deal can be trashed out with the club.

'At the moment we are trialling it with Garforth Town football club', he said. 'If it works, we will be looking at doing it from different venues, if we don't have to pay'.

St George's Hall has given its permission already but the biggest stumbling block is how to find the \$5,000 needed to buy the necessary equipment. 'It would be great if we can make this happen' said Ashley. 'Anything that will boost the experience of patients during their stay in hospital.

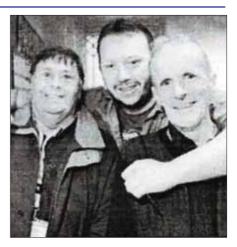
'The hardest part for us is the cost. We are a registered charity and have to raise all the funds we spend. We have to establish the best way of doing this and the most cost-effective.'

The station currently has around 20 volunteers and one of them is Derek Ellis, 66, of Naples Street, Bradford.

Derek can be heard broadcasting four mornings a week and has been involved with the station for three and a half years.

Thave been interested in music since I was little and since I retired this gives me something to do and I really enjoy it,' he said.

A recent addition to the team is presenter ad PR man George Sumner of Halifax, who has ben involved with hospital radio for many years – the last nine of them in Calderdale.

Changing allegiances to Radio Royal has given him a new enthusiasm and he plans to work hard raising the profile of the station and make all the exciting plans for the future happen.

'We all do this because we get a kick out of putting a smile on people's faces', he said.

The station prides itself on bringing as much entertainment as possible to patients who can't get out and one date in the diary coming up is certain to be a big hit with younger listeners. Presenter Liam Scott, 17, will be interviewing the band McFly next month when they come to perform in Bradford.

An opportunity like this is why many young people get involved in hospital radio. It is a great apprenticeship for getting a job in radio and many well known DJs started out this way.

Radio Royal's 50 year milestone was marked by an award from the Hospital Broadcasting Association, a national charity which promotes and supports hospital broadcasting in the UK and all the volunteers hope it will still be going strong in another 50. There has been talk of the station merging with its sister station St Lukes Sound which broadcasts to St Lukes Hospital and Bradford Teaching Hospitals, which runs the two hospitals, carried out a review of hospital radio in 2006.

Because the Trust is transferring all its in patient beds from St Lukes to BRI, it proposed just one station for both sites – something which was opposed by Radio Royal.

'It may come eventually, St Luke's is running out of beds', said Ashley. 'There are pros and cons but we think the cons are bigger.

'We would lose the personal touch and will continue to put forward a case against such a merger.'

The new state-of-the-art studios will help further the quality of our programming to Broomfield, St. Peters and St. Johns Hospitals."

Norman Bishop, HRC's public relations officer, said, "We are so thrilled Susie was able to come along and open our new studios. For the first time in HRC's 43-year history we are able to accommodate guests and volunteers who rely on a wheelchair to aid their mobility."

Hospital Radio Chelmsford provides a wide range of radio programmes to patients in St. Johns and Broomfield Hospitals in Chelmsford and to St. Peters Hospital in Maldon. We broadcast 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year.

What I've Learnt

Put the listeners first

So this year I'm marking ten years in hospital radio. I've received my HBA long service certificate, which is now proudly hanging on the wall of Castle Mead Radio in Hinckley, Leicestershire.

Ten years is a fairly long period of time but I realise that compared to many of you reading this, I remain a mere boy in terms of the number of years of involvement. I salute your dedication to our very special form of public service.

In this new column, I hope to set out some of the things I've learnt ... about hospital radio and myself ... since I first responded to a letter calling for new members, in my local newspaper, as a 17-year old in 1997.

The biggest lesson I've learnt is to always respect and put first your listeners.

Without them we might as well shut up shop, pack away our CDs, microphones and mixing desks and ride off, cowboy like, into the sunset.

As a teenager, there was always a tendency to play the music I liked and not put the listeners' wishes into practise. Though, to be fair to myself, it's not like I was ever a hard rock or thrash metal lover; I'm somewhat ashamed to say my CD player, in the 80' and 90s, was more likely to have the Stock, Aitken and Waterman back catalogue blaring out of it, than anything else.

"Especially for you ..."

Sorry I went into Kylie and Jason mode for a second there (ah, the memories!!).

But the point is still there, whilst I may have wanted to play songs from the 80s or 90s, I came to realise that our listeners, from a generation older than my own, wanted to hear 60's and 70's music.

The same goes for the speech content.

I may have wanted to witter on about the programmes I liked watching, or subjects that were dear to my heart but I always had to ask myself 'are my listeners interested in this?'

Though it's sometimes hard, we must ALWAYS put our listeners first.

They, not you and I, at least in this respect, are the ones that matter.

Because, you know, when push comes to shove, it is they who have the power to switch you off ... and in hospital radio if too many people do that, you may end up with no listeners at all.

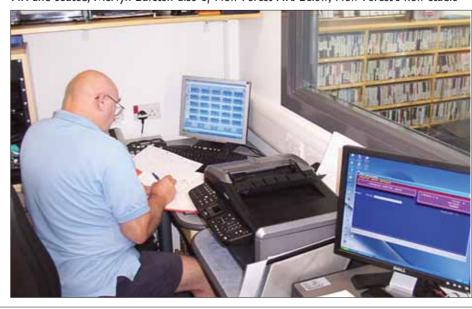

Conference Bursary

The HBA Conference Bursary was introduced in 1994 in memory of Brian Snowden, acknowledging his commitment to the Association and hospital radio. The bursary is now also dedicated to Ken Fulstow, George and Myra Burton, and Helen Hamilton, recognising their contributions to the Association.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? – Applicants should be active volunteers within a Full Member of the HBA. The successful applicant usually has not previously attended a conference. We are unable to award bursaries to young persons under the age of 18 unless we receive written parental consent and an adult from the applicant's station is willing to accept responsibility for their welfare whilst attending conference.

THE PURPOSE – The bursary provides successful applicants with an opportunity to meet fellow hospital broadcasters, and to find out about the work of other stations and the HBA. HBA conferences provide a training opportunity through seminars and workshops, and enable delegates to network with fellow hospital broadcasters, providing insight into the wider aspects of hospital broadcasting and the national association.

Successful applicants are required to write a report on the conference for their station's management committee, with a copy provided to the HBA Treasurer within one month of the conference. The report should explain what the recipient learnt at conference, detail the best and least good things about the weekend, and suggest ideas that the station's management committee should consider implementing.

WHAT DOES IT COVER? - The bursary pays up to the residential costs for individual applicants to attend the full weekend conference. Applications for payment of travel costs will also be considered.

HOW DO I APPLY? – Applicants should complete Section 1 the attached form, and then obtain the endorsement of the Chairman (or another officer) of their station in Section 2. The completed form should be sent to Julie Cox, HBA Treasurer, 37 Alford Street, Grantham, Lincolnshire, NG31 8BX, to be received at least twelve weeks before the conference to which the application refers.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT? – Applications are judged on merit by the HBA's Conference Bursary Subcommittee, which consists of June Snowden, Julie Cox and Nigel Dallard. The full terms of reference of the subcommittee can be found on the members-only section of the HBA website, or are available on request. Applicants will be informed of the success or otherwise of their application at least 8 weeks before the conference. Successful applicants will be required to pay an amount equivalent to the deposit payable for the conference, such amount being repaid on the submission to the HBA Treasurer of a copy of their report on the conference.

ARE APPLICANTS' NAMES PUBLISHED? – HBA would prefer to be able to publicise the names of those in receipt of the bursary. We do, however, understand that applicants may be sensitive about this information being released. You can, therefore, request that your name remain confidential by ticking the appropriate box on the application form. We will, however, be obliged to release your name to the Charity Commission if they ask for it after reviewing our Annual Report and Accounts, even if you ask for it to remain confidential.

PLEASE NOTE – The decision of the Conference Bursary Subcommittee is final and no correspondence will be entered into. If it is deemed that all the applicants are inappropriate, the award may not be given. The attendance, as paying delegates, of other volunteers from the same HBA member will not affect an application, except that we are unable to make awards to young persons under the age of 18 who are attending conference unaccompanied by an adult.

HBA Grants

The HBA Grants programme was introduced in 2006 following the Executive Committee's suggestion to PPL that a proportion of their donations to the Association in 2004 and 2005 be allocated for grants to member stations.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? - Applications are restricted to Full Members of the HBA.

THE PURPOSE – The grants are intended to enable hospital broadcasting organisations to purchase equipment or other materials required by them which they are unable to afford to purchase from their own funds.

HOW DO I APPLY? – Applicants should identify the equipment or other materials that meet(s) their needs and should obtain a quotation (ideally more than one) for the supply. They should then complete the application form and send it, together with copies of the quotation(s), their constitution (or other governing document) and their latest annual report & accounts, to Dave Nicholson, HBA Vice President, East Cottage, Milbourne Hall, Milbourne, Newcastle upon Tyne, NE20 0EB.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT? – Applications will be acknowledged on receipt. The subcommittee will meet bi-monthly to consider applications. As soon as possible after consideration, applicants will be informed as to the success or otherwise of their application. Successful applicants should expect to receive a cheque within 28 days of their application being granted. Copies of invoices confirming purchase of the equipment/materials should be forwarded to HBA within 6 months of the grant cheque being issued. Failure to provide such evidence of purchase may result in full repayment of the grant being requested.

Applications are judged on merit by the HBA's Grants Subcommittee, which consists of Dave Nicholson, John Harper, Dave Lockyer and a representative from PPL. If a conflict of interest arises between a member of the subcommittee and an application, the conflicted member will withdraw from discussions surrounding the particular application and, if necessary, further temporary members will be co-opted to the subcommittee. The full terms of reference of the subcommittee can be found on the members-only section of the HBA website, or are available on request.

ARE DETAILS OF SUCCESSFUL APPLICATIONS PUBLISHED? – HBA would like to maximise the publicity obtained, both local to the recipient of the grant and nationally, and would expect successful applicants to work closely with the HBA's Public Relations Manager to achieve this.

HBA would anticipate providing details of all grants made in its Annual Report and Accounts.

PLEASE NOTE – The decision of the Grants Subcommittee is final and no correspondence will be entered into. The subcommittee may, at its sole discretion, provide unsuccessful applicants with an indication as to why their application failed - for instance, applicants can expect to be informed if they failed to provide all necessary supporting paperwork, or their application was deemed ineligible in other ways. However, applicants should understand that the funds available are limited and not all applications that meet all the required criteria are likely to be funded.

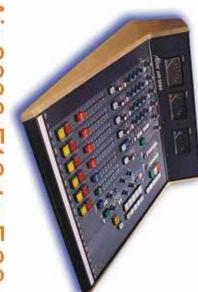
